Rural Healthcare Surge Readiness: Developed by the COVID-19 Healthcare Resilience Working Group, this tool provides critical resources for rural health systems to prepare for and respond to a COVID-19 surge. To read more, see <u>Rural Healthcare Surge Readiness</u>.

Addressing Opioid Overdose Deaths: The Vision for the HEALing Communities Study: Highlights a study on the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic on the ongoing HEALing Communities Study (HCS), which began in 2019 with the goal of reducing opioid overdose deaths by 40% over 3 years. Medicaid Telehealth Policies in Response to COVID-19: Provides an overview of Medicaid telehealth policies before and in response to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency (PHE). Discusses how states have utilized existing flexibilities and PHE-specific federal authorities to increase the number of services, provider types, and other telehealth coverage options under Medicaid. State Medicaid Programs Respond to Meet COVID-19 Challenges: Results from a 50-State Medicaid Budget Survey for State Fiscal Years 2020 and 2021: Report examines changes taking place in Medicaid programs in the 50 states and the District of Columbia. Features sections on eligibility and enrollment; provider rates and taxes; delivery systems; long-term services and supports; benefits, cost-sharing, and telehealth; and pharmacy cost containment actions. Highlights challenges posed by the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency (PHE) and policy changes taken in response to the PHE. In the News:

Oct 19, 2020 -- Domestic Violence in Rural America Increased During COVID-19: Addresses the rise in domestic violence and abuse in rural America during the COVID-19 pandemic, with economic pressures and limited access to transportation contributing to the increase. Describes how social distancing requirements limits shelter capacity, discusses the potential long-term impacts on children exposed to domestic violence.

Oct 16, 2020 -- Data Collection Site Launched for the RHC COVID-19 Testing Program: The National Association of Rural Health Clinics (NARHC) launched the online portal to collect official data for the Rural Health Clinic (RHC) COVID-19 Testing Program. All RHCs that received money from the program are required to report through this portal, which requests basic data regarding COVID-19.

Oct 16, 2020 -- <u>Rural Jails Reel as U.S. Coronavirus Cases Surpass 8 Million</u>: Covers an outbreak of COVID-19 in a rural Montana jail, in which infections make up a quarter of all known virus cases in the county. Describes how COVID-19 is affecting the rest of the town, as hospitals and the public health system are at capacity. Discusses the difficulty of containing the spread of infection as social distancing in the jail is nearly impossible.

Oct 14, 2020 -- <u>CMS Adds 11 New Telehealth Services to Medicare Coverage</u>: Reports that Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has added 11 new telehealth services to the list of services it will pay for during the COVID-19 public health emergency.
